Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

It may seem early to be talking about Easter/Resurrection Sunday, but it is important, and we don't just count it as another holiday, we want to allow this season of Lent and Resurrection to impact our faith walk.

Remember the Bible is essentially God's great love story for us. The story begins all the way back in the Garden of Eden with Adam and Eve when their disobedience opened the door for the sin that entered the world, and along with it came the pain and suffering that we still deal with today.

March 5th is the start of the 40-day period leading up to Easter. The ash used on Ash Wednesday symbolizes grief and sorrow over sin (ours and that which is so evident in our world today) and points us to repentance.

It is during this 40-day period when we can purposely step up our prayer and Bible time by purposely fasting some things like a meal, some TV or gaming time, or whatever is on your heart. It's also a time when we can look for areas that we purposefully give of ourselves through our time, talent, and/or treasure, reminding ourselves that Jesus gave it all.

Let's look at some of the other aspects of the Lenten season.

Palm Sunday: The journey begins with Jesus' entry into Jerusalem amidst cheers and palm branches, known as Palm Sunday. This event signifies the start of Holy Week, where Jesus shared the Last Supper with his disciples before his betrayal by Judas Iscariot, initiating communion.

Good Friday: This is the day of Jesus' crucifixion and death on the cross, a solemn day of remembrance for Christians worldwide. The sacrifice made on this day serves as a reminder of God's unconditional love for humanity.

Resurrection Sunday: Resurrection Day dawns with the miraculous event of Jesus rising from the dead, leaving an empty tomb, conquering sin, and offering salvation to all who believe. This joyous occasion celebrates new beginnings and eternal life through Christ's resurrection

Why we celebrate: Easter serves as a reminder of hope, new life, and the love of God for all of us, His children. It symbolizes the triumph of light over darkness, good over evil and life over death. In our world today, we need this good news more than ever.

The congregation was incorporated in 1883 under the laws of the State of Wisconsin. The cemetery was purchased from O. N. Hillger on July 14, 1892 and the land consecrated on July 31.

Edward C. Ross Obituary

With heavy hearts, we announce the passing of Edward (Ed) Charles Ross Jr., 73, of Wilton, Wisconsin, on February 24, 2025, following a brief illness. Ed, a devoted son, brother, uncle, and faithful servant of God, peacefully entered the presence of the Lord, surrounded by his loving family.

Ed was born on October 4, 1951, at 8:35 a.m. to Edward and Shirley (Wambaja) Ross at Sherman Hospital in Elgin, Illinois. Raised in a home filled with love, he shared his childhood with his three brothers, who were his lifelong companions and closest friends. Ed was baptized into the Christian faith on April 19, 1953, at Zion English Evangelical Church in Elgin.

After graduating from St. Charles High School in 1969, Ed attended Elgin Community College and Illinois State University for four years before working at Stewart Warner Warehouse. In 1975, he moved to Wilton, where he farmed alongside his father until his retirement.

A longtime member of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Wilton, Ed was known for his unwavering faith. He sat faithfully in the last pew each Sunday, and for many years, he participated in the Maundy Thursday reenactment of the Lord's Supper, playing the role of James, the Son of Alphaeus. Ed's commitment to his church family was evident in many ways, including his generous blood donations for the church-sponsored Red Cross blood drive. To his church family, Ed was a beloved friend, and we find comfort knowing that now, he sits at the front of the church, close to the Lord.

A passionate fan of the Chicago Bears and Cubs, Ed remained hopeful each season that "next year" would be their year. He loved spending Sundays watching football with his family and was an active participant in local sports, playing softball for Geier's IGA and enjoying ice skating and hockey in his younger years. Ed's greatest love, second only to his faith, was his family. He took immense joy in hosting family gatherings, especially his legendary annual 4th of July fireworks show, always followed by his signature pineapple upside-down cake. Visits with Ed always ended with his warm and welcoming words, "Come again."

Ed was preceded in death by his brother, Ron (Sue Ross Brueggen), and his parents, Edward and Shirley Ross. He is survived by his brothers Larry (Vickie) and Rob (Lana), as well as his nieces Sarah, Becky, Bethany, Caitie, Kristen, Erin, and Amanda; his nephews Tim and Ryan; and many great-grandnieces and nephews who will carry on his legacy.

Ed's life was a mix of faith, humor, love, and an unshakable hope that one day, the Bears and Cubs would actually pull it off. While we'll miss him, we know he's enjoying a front-row seat in heaven, cracking jokes with the angels and reminding everyone there's always next year. Rest in peace, Ed—you may not have won a Super Bowl, but you certainly won at life.

Harlow "Bud" Beck Osteboe Obituary

Harlow Beck "Bud" Osteboe of Wilton, WI died on 2/25/2025 following a short illness. His beloved wife of 55 years, Carol A. Osteboe (nee Eckelberg), preceded him in death in June 2019.

Bud was born in Windom, MN on 8/16/1936 to Edith Beck Osteboe and Harlow Andrew Osteboe. After his father left the family when Bud was nine years old, he and his two sisters, Joyce and Phoebe, were raised by their mother and extended family. Bud was a proud southern Minnesota "flatlander" and carried a life-long respect and gratitude for the people of that area, especially for the cadre of family and men of the Trimont, MN community who helped launch him into adulthood.

Bud graduated from Central High School in Waseca, MN in 1954. In August 1956, instead of enrolling in dental school as planned, he asked an Air Force recruiter, "How do you get into Air Force pilot training?" That launched a career and enduring love with flying.

After five years as a U.S. Air Force pilot flying B-25s, he returned to Minnesota to pursue a Bachelor's degree at the University of Minnesota while serving in the Minnesota Air National Guard flying KC-97 aircraft. His Guard unit was activated for a year of duty in September 1961 in response to the Second Berlin Crisis. He eventually earned his Bachelor's from U of MN in 1964. During this period of time, he met and married Carol Eckelberg of Wilton, WI. "It was the most fortunate event of my life," he frequently told people. They went on to raise their two sons, Thor and Paul; care for their elderly parents; support one another in their professional pursuits; and enjoy a variety of travels, symphony concerts, and family memories together.

In 1965 Bud was hired as a pilot by United Air Lines based out of Chicago's O'Hare International Airport, flying both domestic and international routes. The family lived in Wheaton, IL.

Bud soon became heavily involved in the administration of the national Air Line Pilots Association pensions and specialty insurance programs, and also in those of the International Federation of Air Line Pilots Associations based in London. In 1994 at a meeting in Hong Kong, he was honored by International Federation for his efforts in helping negotiate and implement pension and specialty insurance programs for pilot groups of the former Iron Curtain countries. He ended his career at United as a line pilot, after serving as head of the United Pilot group and member of United's corporate Board of Directors during the early period of employee ownership.

As retirement approached, Carol and Bud decided to make their home among the beautiful hills of western Wisconsin in Carol's childhood hometown of Wilton. They had purchased farm land just south of Wilton when their sons were young and spent a great deal of family time planting trees on the property. Local builder Bob Braund built their new home on this land. Bud was fortunate to have been able to stay in his home until just a few weeks prior to his death.

Bud is survived by two sons: Thor (Megan) of Plymouth, MN and Paul of Golden, CO; seven grandchildren: Gunnar of Salt Lake City, UT, Karenna, Kirsten and Maren of Plymouth, MN, Sara of Evergreen, CO, Jiselle and Gretchen of Golden, CO; many beloved nieces and nephews and numerous cherished friends. In addition to his wife, he was preceded in death by his mother and two sisters.

A Visitation will be held from 4-7 pm on Friday, March 7 at Smith Nelson Funeral Home in Wilton.

A private burial will take place on Saturday, March 8 followed by a Celebration of Life Service at 1:30pm at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Wilton.
