I also asked for prayers for our church leaders and others. Thankfully, the inauguration and accompanying activities at the Capitol in Washington, D. C., and the areas surrounding the state capitols, were overall calm and peaceful. Thank you for your prayers, for we know that prayers help! The Wisconsin Council of Churches (WCC) has designated January 18-25, as the "Week of Prayer for Christian Unity." It occurs each year, "between the feasts of St. Peter and St. Paul. Its observance is over 100 years old." (All words in quotes are from the WCC website.) "This year's theme is 'Abide in my love...you shall bear much fruit' from John 15:1-17."
